NBA XPLOR is a prophetic movement of and for young adults who are discerning lives of care and service. The Residency provides 10-month professional development and vocational discernment opportunities for 21- to 30-year-olds to live simply in community and engage in direct service and justice work. Through NBA XPLOR, we partner young adults with Disciples congregations, regional and general ministries, and wider communities—positively engaging neighborhoods, the congregations, and the young adults.

FOUR CORNERSTONES OF NBA XPLOR

- **Hands-on Service/Justice Work:** Residents intern with nonprofit community-based agencies for 30 hours per week to empower local mission efforts while gaining a professional skillset and increasing their awareness of and response to systems of injustice.
- **Simple Living in Community:** Residents learn and practice faithful, intentionally simple, and culturally competent communal living.
- **Spiritual Discernment on Vocation:** Residents strive through spiritual disciplines to discern the purpose for which their souls are made.
- **Disciples Leadership Development:** Working with a spiritual companion and congregations, Residents live out their Disciples identity and unleash their leadership capacity.

Additionally, NBA XPLOR is committed to the solid foundation of diversity as a major component of intentional community living. Ongoing anti-racism, cross-cultural communication, and anti-oppression training are integral components of NBA XPLOR spiritual and leadership development.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1. What is NBA XPLOR?

NBA XPLOR is a faith-based, 10-month, congregationally hosted Residency for 21- to 30-year-olds who are discerning lives of care and service. The Residency runs mid-August through mid-June.

2. What does an NBA XPLOR Residency involve?

Residents live under one roof within a diverse community of peers, where they engage in communal and personal spiritual practices ranging from prayer to simple daily meals together. They care for and learn from others in community-engagement internships, and they relate to their Host Congregation. This communal lifestyle is not typical in our culture, and yet it helps Residents examine and live out their values more intentionally and faithfully.

3. What does a typical week of Residency look like?

A Residency week makes time for all facets of the Residency experience: 30 hours per week of direct, hands-on learning and work in the Community Engagement Site; weekly Sabbath time for personal and collective spiritual reflection, along with an experienced Spiritual Companion; free time for personal care (grocery shopping, laundry, entertainment, and rest); and about six hours a week serving and worshipping with the Host Congregation.

4. Do I have to be a Disciples of Christ church member to apply?

No, but Disciples may understand and experience NBA XPLOR in unique ways. This program does give preference to Disciples candidates, but the most important requisite is for the young adult to be curious how and where God might be calling—and they are ready to explore that call within a Disciples context.

5. What if a Resident is still sorting out religion/spirituality?

NBA XPLOR is intentionally formed to help Residents engage in “discernment”—intentional asking of how and where God might be calling someone in his/her personal, professional, spiritual, and relational life. We don’t assume Residents have all the “big questions” figured out. On the contrary, sorting out religion, theology, and spirituality is a life-long quest. NBA XPLOR helps Residents realize that and equip and affirm them in that journey.

6. Who would make a good Resident?

NBA XPLOR Residents are young adults who want their lives to make a difference but may not be certain as to what steps to take in that direction. They may have served in the military and want to explore a new service opportunity. They may have finished an undergraduate degree, but classroom education wasn’t enough to make their vocational path clear. They may feel a call to an ordained ministry of one sort or another, but going to seminary or pursuing a not-for-profit or social work degree seems premature. They may have started work right out of high school and now want a new opportunity that allows them to really consider how they want to engage in the world. NBA XPLOR provides an “in-between” time to reflect, discern, and decide what is next.

7. How much does it cost to be a Resident?

This Residency costs a sincere commitment to see where God may be calling, but Residents do not pay for their time in NBA XPLOR. Houses are set up to allow Residents to live modestly on a monthly stipend, with housing and utilities provided by the Host Congregation(s).

8. What about health insurance and deferment of student loans during NBA XPLOR?

Residents who are not otherwise covered by a health insurance policy may become part of a group policy through the Catholic Volunteer Network. For student loans, NBA offers guidance for approaching a lender to request student loan deferment. Although loan deferment is not guaranteed, programs like NBA XPLOR have had great success in achieving deferment.

9. What is the application process for NBA XPLOR?
