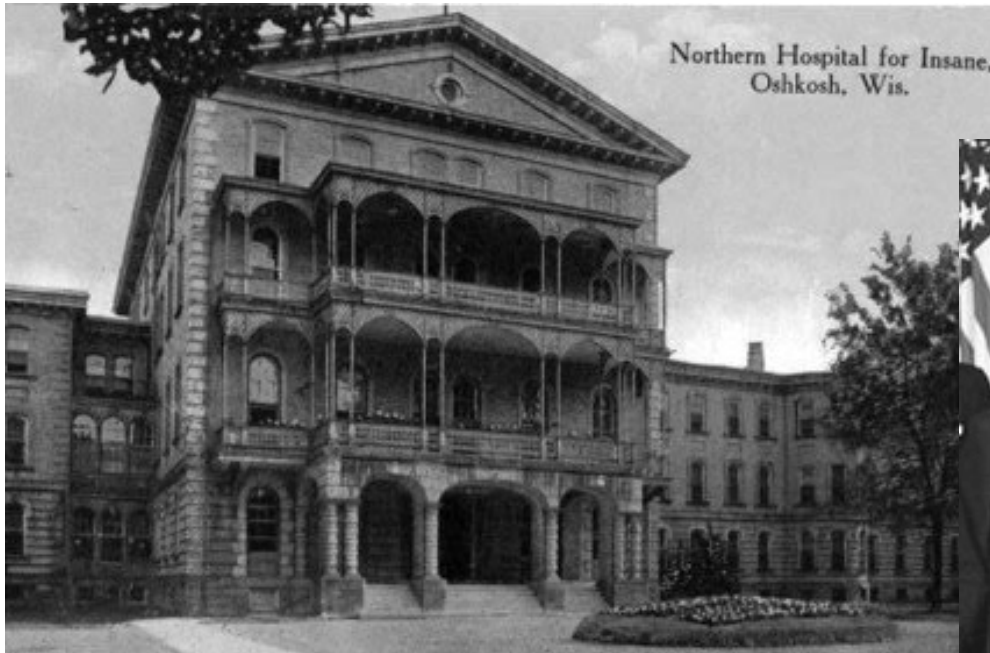

We Have A Problem

In a 2006 Special Report, the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) estimated that 705,600 mentally ill adults were incarcerated in state prisons; 78,800 in federal prisons; and 479,900 in local jails.

*“Even more than other areas of health and medicine, the mental health field is plagued by disparities in the availability of and access to its services.” Consequently, many of the individuals released into the community without support ended up incarcerated; it is fair to say that, instead of being “deinstitutionalized,” a great number of individuals suffering with mental illness were, in fact, **“trans-institutionalized”** into America’s jails and prisons.*

The Pendulum Swings

In 2012, there were **10 times** as many mentally ill persons in prisons and jails than in state hospitals.

mentally ill patients



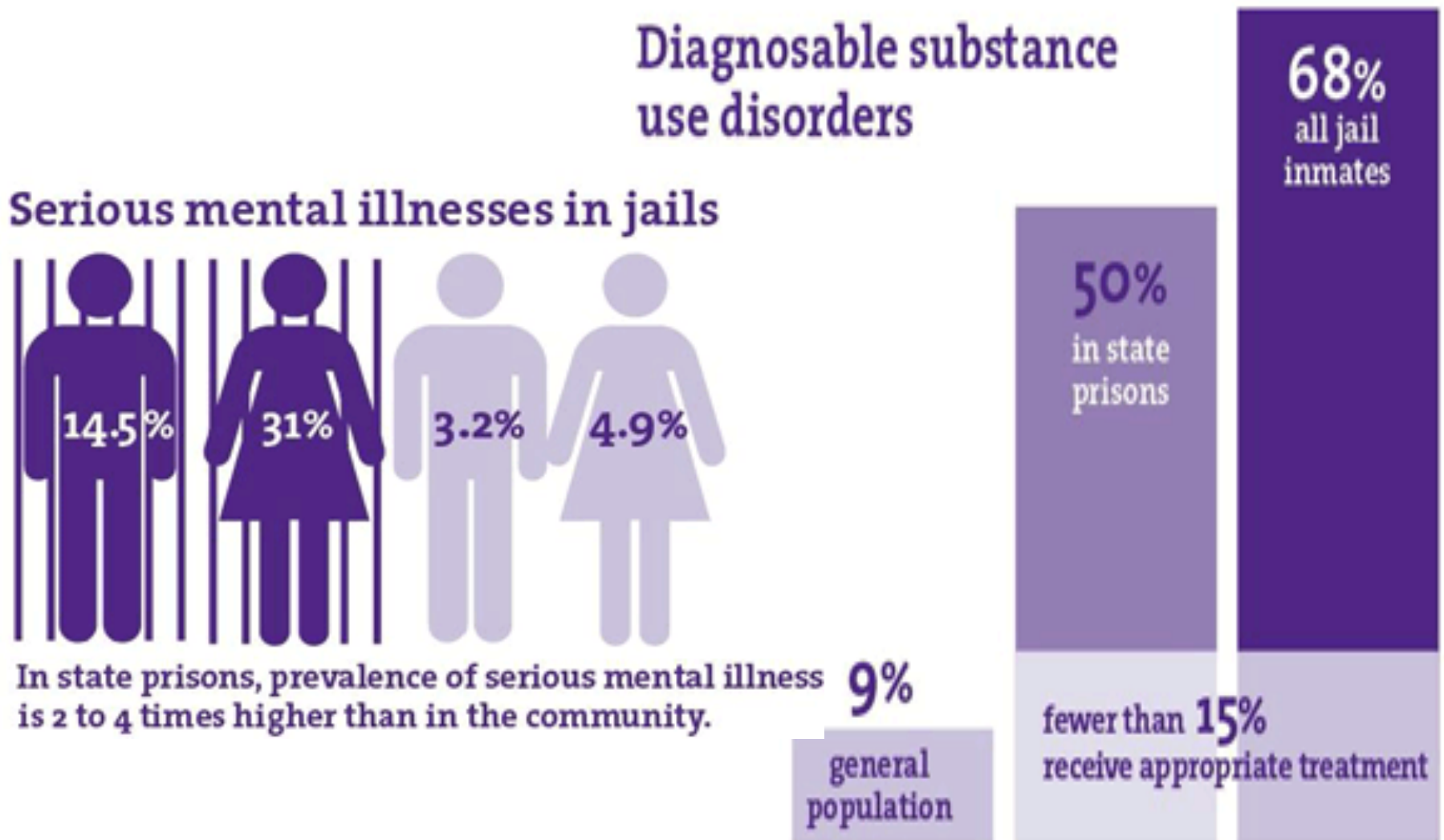
Prisons and jails:

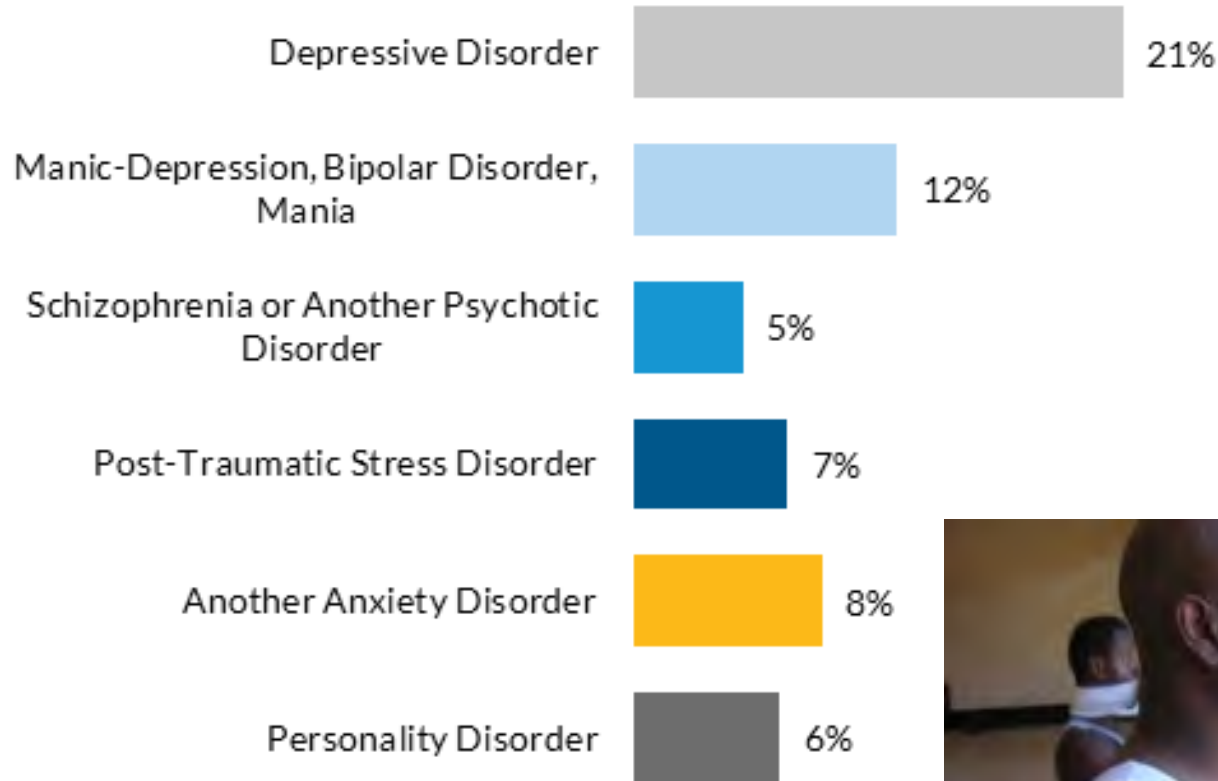
The three largest mental health providers in the nation today are jails: Cook County in Illinois, Los Angeles County, and Riker's Island in New York.

What We Now Find

Prisoners' mental health issues



SUICIDE is the leading cause of death among inmates in local jails, and in the top five for state prisons.



A Strained System

- About **1 out of 3** state prisoners with mental health problems, **1 out of 4** federal prisoners, and **1 out of 6** jail inmates had received mental health treatment since admission.
- Taking a prescribed medication was the most common type of treatment.
- **People with mental illnesses are overrepresented in probation and parole populations, at estimated rates ranging from two to four times the general population.**
